# What is Hajj?

Christian Health Care Center thrives in its mission — to provide skilled nursing care with compassion and love in Christ's name — in part because of the many great team members who give of themselves each and every day to serve others. We are people from many backgrounds and experiences, gathered together here on Aaron Drive each day to care for those who need it, and the diversity of cultures present in the CHCC halls each day deserves to be honored and celebrated. To that end, The Pulse periodically features various cultural traditions and celebrations.

ajj is a pilgrimage to the Islam holy city of Mecca, which is located in Saudi Arabia. The pilgrimage is considered one of the five pillars of Islam.

The religion requires that each adult Muslim who is financially and physically capable take the pilgrimage at least once in their lifetime. This year, the pilgrimage will take place beginning on July 28 and ending Aug 2.

In recent decades, more than 2 million people have completed the pilgrimage each year. However, the number of people undertaking Hajj in 2020 will be much lower due to coronavirus restrictions.

According to CNN, the pilgrimage includes numerous detailed rituals, including the wearing of a spe-

Did you know that leaders who have well-developed listening ears are more approachable? People often feel comfortable sharing new ideas (and even critiques) with those who have developed a good listening ear. Well-developed listening ears are a benefit to the health of any organization.

If you find yourself frequently interrupting others who may be trying to share information with you, and if you want to work on improving your listening skills, here are three tips to try.

Fold your hands during meetings. The physical

act of folding or even sitting on your hands when someone else is speaking can be a physical reminder for you to be still and pay at-

Any time that you find yourself interrupting, apologize to the person who was speaking, then ask them to please continue.

Bring a note pad and pen to meetings. Write your questions down and then ask them at a time when you won't be interjecting into someone else's speaking time.

Any time that you find yourself interrupting, apologize to the person who was speaking, then ask them to please continue before you share your thoughts and opinions.

If you pause and think of co-workers who make you feel heard when you speak to them, does anyone immediately come to mind? Today may be a great day to let them know that you recognize and appreciate their listening skills and that they are inspiring you to improve yours!

cial garment symbolizing human equality and unity before God, the symbolic stoning of evil, and a circular, counter-clockwise procession around the Kaaba, which is the most sacred shrine of Islam and the main goal of the pilgrimage.

People who have completed the pilgrimage may add the phrase al-Hajj or hajji (pilgrim) to their names.
