Corlee Spelgatti: 1937-2022

Corlee Spelgatti, an employee of CHCC for more than 35 years, passed away recently. She was 85.

To hear her co-workers tell it, Corlee was a dependable, compassionate, kind-hearted and tenacious team member who consistently put others' needs above her own.

"I thank God for her life, which was dedicated to helping others," said Lois H., a longtime co-worker of Corlee's in the dietary department. "She truly was an inspiration to all of us."

Corlee began her CHCC career in 1985, mending clothing and other items in the sewing department. She would later move to laundry and house-keeping before landing a long-term role in dietary.

She loved to work weekends with the high school and college students, who took to calling her "grandma," said Carol Du-Bois, the dietary manager. Corlee possessed extensive knowl-

edge about her craft, DuBois said, and taught many CHCC employees over the years.

"Corlee was my mentor for all the years working at CHCC in the same department," Lois remembered. "She taught me the ins and outs of the hostess position and the dietary rules in

What is one thing most people don't know about you but you wish they did?


I have a great sense of humor! I also have a life motto: Be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to anger. James 1:19.

For the past few years, Corlee was on afternoon hydration duty, a role she relished because it enabled her to visit with those who lived at CHCC.

"They all loved Corlee and looked forward to her visits each day," DuBois said.

Corlee was loved by residents and team members both. During her many years at CHCC, Corlee's name would come up regularly in Shining Star nominations from her peers.

"Corlee has the most amazing work ethic ever," said Leah M. in one such recent nomination. "She is fiercely independent and incredibly dedicated to CHCC, and especially to the residents here. She is always positive, has a great outlook, is kind and compassionate, and is also a wonderful mother, grandmother, friend and co-worker."

Corlee's husband, John, preceded her in death in 2016. The couple were married for 55 years.


We will miss Corlee's energy and joy around the building, and we sure are thankful to have been able to work with her for so many years.
